His affection for his work imbued all his life. We could say, he looked at the world through an ecologist's glasses.

He looked upon the horrible 9/11 terrorist attacks as the breakdown of the soul's balance and the collapse of the world's hygiene. His life work and experience made him abhor the selection of the unfittest, an ideology that would destroy races, ideas or institutions.
